Dear friends,



## Food banks

Carol and Paddy Henderson founded The Trussell Trust network of Food Banks in 1997.



After being brought up in Mumbai and bringing up two daughters they decided to change the direction of their lives to work helping others. They had an interview with Tearfund, a global charity dedicated to ending poverty, and were offered a job in Armenia delivering dried food and oil to people whose lives had been devastated by the fall of communism and an earthquake claiming 30,000 lives. They lived in icy conditions, sleeping on horsehair mattresses next to survivors with empty water containers and makeshift hovels. It was seeing these poor forgotten Armenians that led to a frustration of the limits we were allowed to give. They needed help to empower them to build better futures for themselves. The first sustainable project was giving money to an orphanage to buy pigs so they could start to produce their own meat. These funds came from sharing our stories with others in the U.K.

They then went on to Bulgaria, feeding street children who had nowhere to go outside school terms. The orphanages were closed and many ended up glue sniffing or resorting to crime to survive.

When they came back home to Salisbury their stories were picked up by the local paper and a woman called to ask why they weren't helping those in need on their doorstep. They had no idea that children in the area were going to bed hungry because parents had to choose between food and electricity, so with the help of a legacy from her mother, Betty Trussell, who died in 1997, they set up the first Trussell Trust food bank from their shed, collecting food to help local families. Many had fallen into debt over basic expenses such as children's clothing or essential household repairs.

The principles they developed then still hold firm today. That all food should be donated and volunteers enlisted to administer the food and provide non judgemental support.

They never forgot the Balkans experience and continued to help the orphanage, by the collection and delivery of thousands of lovingly wrapped Christmas boxes. They handed the Trussell Trust over to new management in 2007 as they moved to New Zealand to be near their two daughters.

## **Ecumenical service on Sunday 14th March led by Catherine from St George's Church, Owlsmoor**

Catherine read the following passage from 1 Thessalonians 1:4-7

'For we know, brothers and sisters loved by God that he has chosen you, because our gospel came to you not simply with words but also with power, with the Holy Spirit and deep conviction. You know how we lived among you for your sake. You became imitators of us and of the Lord, for you welcomed the message in the midst of severe suffering with the joy given by the Holy Spirit. And so you became a model to all the believers in Macedonia and Achaia.'

After a little while of pondering on the text, Sharon then re-read the passage and we again were asked to think of what in that passage of God's word spoke to us. We had quite a lot of participation and it was wonderful that folk felt comfortable enough in this ecumenical setting to share what God was saying to them through his word. Several things stood out to us through this reading and we discussed these at length:

God has chosen us, which made us feel honoured, special and loved  
The message of the gospel is not the saying of clever words, it is said in the power of the Holy Spirit, who is the one to convict a person of their need of a Saviour

God's Holy Spirit gives us joy even in the midst of suffering  
As in the early church, we too can be witnesses to the Lord through the way in which we conduct ourselves as Christians

These were the main points that we shared. It is so easy to read a passage of scripture without taking in the implications and deeper meaning. It is good to ponder and reflect on scripture and allow God to speak to you through it.

With prayer and song, we had a wonderful, uplifting time of worship and discussion.

## Coming back to church services—some guidelines for when we're open again—hopefully Easter Day

- If you are feeling unwell we request that you do not come to church.
- Each individual will need to wear a face mask/covering unless you are medically exempt.
- The Church **will open at 1020** for the service to begin at 1030.
- Please enter the Church through the entrance on Scotland Hill Road. The door at the back of the hall will be closed by the car park. You will be asked to wait outside if there are too many people in the welcome area.
- Please use one of the hand sanitisers in the welcome area.
- Then go on through into the main worship area and sit down on a chair not marked with a red cross.
- If the main worship area is full the steward will direct you to a chair in the crèche where you will be able to hear the service through a speaker.
- The Service will last 30 – 40 minutes. I'm afraid during the service there will be no communal singing.
- If you need the toilet please use the toilet in the welcome area. Please use hand sanitiser before/after and please clean the toilet/wash basin with the wipes provided.
- If you feel ill during the service please let the steward know.
- At the end of the service please remain seated until the steward asks you to leave.
- Please exit the church through the entrance onto Scotland Hill Road.
- Please can we request you do not congregate outside the entrance onto Scotland Hill Road as people are leaving.
- If you wish to talk to friends please walk round to the car park where you can have a social distance chatter there.
- There will be no refreshments.
- At all times we must try to keep a social distance of 1-2 metres while entering, leaving and being in the church.

## A Reflective Evening on Covid

Over 50 people from across the circuit joined the Zoom meeting to hear Dr Brian Gennery and David Morgan.

Soba opened the meeting with prayer, and David and Brian gave their backgrounds. Pandemics appear in the Bible—for example in Numbers 25:9 there was a plague that had killed 64000 people—likely to be bubonic plague.

Similarly something that looks very much like a clinical trial is described in Daniel 1:11-16 where Daniel suggested that eating vegetables and drinking water was better than eating the royal food and wine.

Vaccination has been successful in almost completely eradicating smallpox and polio. The flu vaccination many of us have each year has cut the number of cases. Although it looks as if the Covid vaccine was developed very quickly, no short-cuts have been taken. Brian has looked at the adverse events/reactions to the Covid vaccine here, and even the blood clots recently reported, when investigated, show that fewer blood clots have occurred in vaccinated people than what would be expected in the unvaccinated population.

David shared a graph of the result of having the first dose of the Pfizer vaccine in over 55s showing a significant reduction in cases after 14 days.

Our Christian response? The pandemic won't go away unless we do something about it using the tools God has given us. We should also pray for those affected, bereaved. Helping and caring is part of the teaching of Jesus. Carefully and prayerfully listen to official advice.

There followed a question and answer session and Catherine closed the meeting with prayer.

The session was recorded and can be available through the circuit office, David Morgan or Rev Sharon.
