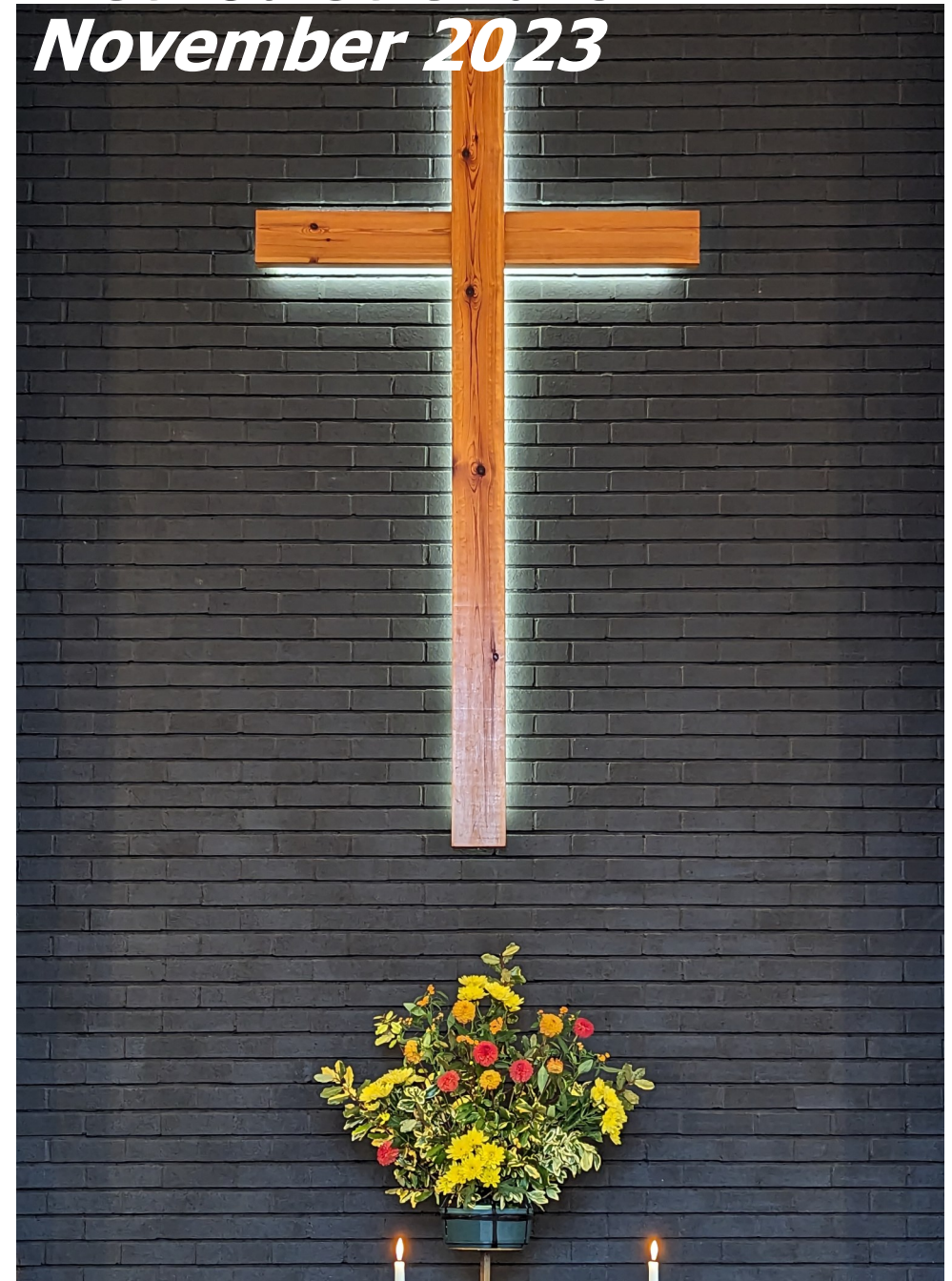

The minister writes...

Dear friends,

In the last newsletter I asked you all, as a church, to prayerfully consider where God might be leading us. I'd like to thank all those who engaged in conversations during the service on the 1st October and who have emailed or spoken to me since, sharing their thoughts and ideas. Please continue to do so.

It is heartwarming to know that we share the same concerns and longings and that we do want to be walking God's path.

Below I share some of your ideas but firstly, let me ask a few more questions:

What is it about coming to church that makes it special for you?

- Worship?
- Singing and praying together?
- Hearing God's word?
- Fellowship?
- Serving others?

Most of you have been followers of Jesus for many years. What *inspires* you and helps you in your daily living out of your faith?

What *excites* you about your faith? What would you most want to share with others?

On Sunday 29th October (just as this newsletter appears) we are going to be thinking about some of those more personal aspects of our faith because it is in those places where we encounter God that we grow spiritually, and out of those experiences that we are encouraged and enabled for mission.

Now, here, in no particular order, are some of the ideas you have shared:

- Have the church open for private prayer and meditation. Either at times of significance (as we did at the outbreak of the Russian/Ukrainian war and could do again now with the Israel/Palestinian situation) or as a regular thing, perhaps on a certain day each month?
- Hold a weekly/ twice-weekly café.
- Sing carols around the local streets, collecting for charity and handing out flyers advertising our Carol Service and other Christmas events/services.
- Consider combining with Crowthorne MC – maybe in new premises.
- Approach the groups who hire our halls and ask if they would like us to pray for any specific concerns they might have, and/or invite them to

attend/take part in a service like the Carol Service.

- Employ a Youth/Families worker jointly with Crowthorne (partially subsidised by Circuit) to build on existing initiatives such as Babes and Tots/Messy Church and to start new ones, helping to establish relationships with families already linked to our church and reaching out to others. (More about this elsewhere in the newsletter.)
- Offer a monthly Sunday afternoon Café style service. Everyone welcome but with families especially in mind.
- Choose one or two people whom we would love to see come to church and pray for them daily, looking for opportunities to invite them to church events and special Sunday services which are especially welcoming to people not in the habit of attending church e.g. Remembrance, Carol Service or a specific service like a grandparents/grandchildren's service or a 'Back-to-Church-Sunday.'

Some of those ideas may seem more blue-sky thinking, some very commendable but would need people and resources to enable, others – like the last one about praying – simple and easy.

Maybe, because it is simple, we underestimate how effective prayer can be. We shouldn't!

I receive Our Daily Bread reflections via email and this one about the power of prayer stood out for me:

In 1982, pastor Christian Führer began Monday prayer meetings at Leipzig's St. Nicholas Church. For years, just a handful gathered to ask God for peace amid global violence and the oppressive East German regime. Though communist authorities watched churches closely, they were unconcerned until attendance swelled and spilled over to mass meetings outside the church gates. On October 9, 1989, seventy thousand demonstrators met and peacefully protested. Six thousand East German police stood ready to respond to any provocation. The crowd remained peaceful, however, and historians consider this day a watershed moment. A month later, the Berlin Wall fell.

That massive transformation all started with a prayer meeting!

As *we* turn to God and begin relying on his wisdom and strength, things often begin to shift and reshape. We must remember that it is God, not us, who enacts the transformation. But *our* prayer is how we participate in the transforming work he is doing.

Friends, let us continue to think and talk and share our ideas. Let us get excited when we begin to see signs that God is in that thinking, talking and sharing – but most of all, let us keep on praying.

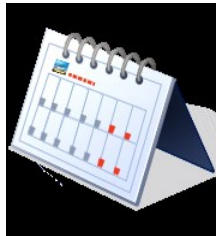

Film night

As usual we gathered for Film Night on the fourth Sunday of the month.

This month we had a really interesting film entitled 'Do no Harm'. It was about a little boy who suffered from a severe form of epilepsy, who was prescribed anti-epilepsy medication which firstly adversely affected his behaviour and then required him to be hospitalised. He was given medication to try and control his epilepsy but the drugs he was given all interacted together producing a cocktail of side effects which required him to stay in hospital. His parents were told that his only hope was brain surgery.

In her desperation his mum researched his condition and found that a hospital in Baltimore treated their epileptic patients with a ketogenic diet, with a good success rate. After overcoming many obstacles, the little boy was finally transferred to this hospital. He had to fast for two days and then the ketogenic diet was introduced. Almost immediately he recovered and finally he was free from epilepsy. Ketogenic diet – I hear you say, how can that make a difference? Surely this is a modern diet fad? Well, no actually, the ketogenic diet was introduced in the 1930's purely to help patients with epilepsy. You can read all about this on Epilepsy Action www.epilepsy.org.uk.

What was amazing was that some of the actors in the film, were not actors at all! They were actual people who had suffered from the condition, had gone onto the ketogenic diet and been successfully treated. What a story.

We have great films, great company, refreshments and pizza midway through the film – why not come along when you can – make it a date!

Pledge Day – Children, Youth & Families Lay Worker

Back in the spring of 2020 we, in partnership with Crowthorne Methodist Church, employed a Children, Youth & Families Lay Worker: Deryn Stewart. Unfortunately, she had no sooner started than we went into lockdown and almost immediately we had to reduce her hours. She continued as best she could via online and written means, but it was not sustainable given how long Covid affected us and prevented groups from meeting again. Deryn and her husband then had to relocate due to his work and she resigned.

We were not, at that time, in a position to employ someone else but the dream and hope of having a Lay Worker shared between the two churches has never vanished.

A very broad outline of the role is that it would involve building on existing initiatives such as Babes and Tots / Messy Church and starting new ones e.g. a summer holiday club. The Lay Worker would establish relationships with the families connected to the two churches, coming alongside them and discovering what sort of activities or services might interest and benefit them. We have quite a number of families connected with our church through user groups (hall hire) and baptism families but we don't often see the children or their families coming to church. The Lay Worker would seek to establish more lasting relationships with these people. They would assist with All Age Worship or Family services. It might also be possible to reach out to local schools by taking assemblies.

There is more to the role than I have indicated here and I can give anyone who is interested a job description but this hopefully gives you an idea.

The biggest constraint has been whether we could afford someone. The role would be for 37.5 hours per week during term time plus two weeks in the holidays (i.e. 41 weeks). A full-time equivalent salary of *about* £23,400 (the actual amount would depend somewhat on the applicant's experience) works out at £12 per hour but there would also be employment costs to be covered e.g. pension contribution etc.

The expectation is that we would pay 25% of their salary, Crowthorne 25% and the Circuit 50%. For us that would mean finding approximately £5.3k per annum or £10.6k to know we could employ someone for a minimum of two years.

In recent months the stewards and I have been discussing how we might revisit this. We have brought it to Church Council for discussion. We know that, financially, we would struggle to pay this out of existing church funds, so it has been agreed that we should hold a Pledge Day (this might be a coffee morning or a Sunday service).

The idea is that we would ask people at church to consider pledging an amount of money (it doesn't have to be a large amount!) either on a monthly basis or as a one-off in order to help fund this role. Pledging, rather than gifting, means that no one has parted with any money *at this stage*. Gifts given for a specific

Recycling for Good Causes

In the vestibule you will notice a largish box which advertises 'Recycling for good causes.'

Please donate your unwanted items from the following list. There are some leaflets available which tell you about what can be recycled but basically it is: Unwanted jewellery - including damaged items and costume jewellery and watches

Coins and currency - any age and UK and foreign both acceptable

Mobile phones, cameras, video cameras and gadgets including ipods, tablets but NOT laptops.

Stamps - single, loose and presentation packs.

The box contains a sack. When the sack is full Recycling for Good Causes will collect it and the church will receive 75% of the proceeds from the sale of the contents within about 8 weeks of collection. (As a guide, at High Cross they received a cheque for £80 - so it is definitely worth doing this!)
