#### The minister writes...

Dear friends,

I don't know if it's quite the done thing for a minister to admit that there are some passages in the Bible that they really don't like very much but I must confess to not being fond of Ecclesiastes! If the author were King Solomon (and scholars dispute this) then, despite his legendary wisdom, I can only say that he was in a bit of a glum place when he wrote it. The refrain, 'Meaningless! Meaningless!' (earlier translations have 'Vanity! Vanity!') appears repeatedly and is applied to everything: wisdom, folly, pleasure, toil, riches, advancement - everything except reverence for God and his commandments.

The most well-known passage is Chapter 3 and 'A time for everything.' I've always felt it stops a bit abruptly and that it needs rounding off (sorry,

Solomon!). Nevertheless, having heard it read at a recent funeral, I was pondering on it and its message that there are seasons for everything. We certainly can't refute the truth in that. We see it in our own lives, don't we? Seasons of youth and vitality giving way to seasons of age and experience. Times of joy, counterbalanced by times of sadness. In the same month we can celebrate the birth of a long-awaited child and mourn the death of someone we love dearly. In our own church community there will be those enjoying a special birthday or anniversary and others travelling the long pathway of grief that leads ultimately to a place of healing.

The passage also speaks of a time to destroy and a time to build, a time to tear and a time to mend. It may be that we encounter times when it seems that everything we've previously enjoyed, maybe even taken for granted, has broken: dreams shattered or discarded, relationships becoming complicated or troubled, illness bringing adjustment and limitation. As we face difficult situations, perhaps it helps to remember that these too are seasons, hard whilst they last but in time we may rebuild, reconcile, heal — or perhaps start over.

The fleeting nature of our lives is something the book explores, its apparent message being that if life is good, enjoy it whilst you can, and if it isn't, don't worry because it will be over all too soon. I'm not sure how comforting I find

His words speak of judgement but not so much of mercy.

Perhaps if the writer of Ecclesiastes had lived 1,000 years later, he might have added something more to his 'A time for everything.' Excuse my audacity but indulge me for a moment.... Perhaps he might have added: 'a time to show mercy and a time to receive forgiveness,' 'a time to despair and a time to hope,' 'a time for the grave and a time for resurrection,' 'a time to be parted and a time to be reunited.

If you were to write your own 'A time for everything' I wonder what **you** would include?

It is lovely to be able to give flowers to members of the congregation—a ministry of flowers.

## Lent: 'The Rest is Worship'

This year during Lent we will be using the Engage Worship resource `The Rest is Worship.'

So often in our Christian lives we focus on 'doing.' It may be some of the myriad activities associated with church life, or helping in the community, or supporting a charity, or demands of work or childcare (including grandchild-care) or looking after older relatives. The list seems endless. There are so many claims on our time that it is difficult to stop and just 'be.'

Yet that is the invitation which Jesus extends to all who would follow him: "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." (Matt. 11:28).

Doesn't that sound wonderful?!

But, I hear you ask, what about all those 'jobs' – don't they still need doing? Well, yes, they do and they will get done but none of us can run on empty and that applies to our spiritual selves just as much as – if not more so - than any other aspect of our lives.

Remember Jesus visiting the home of Martha and Mary?

Martha had a sister called Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet listening to what he said. But Martha was distracted by all the preparations that had to be made. She came to him and asked, "Lord, don't you care that my sister has left me to do the work by myself? Tell her to help me!"

"Martha, Martha," the Lord answered, "you are worried and upset about many things, but few things are needed—or indeed only one. Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her." (Luke 10: 38 – 42)

So this Lent, we are invited to discover for ourselves that rest can be worship too.

Our services during this time will follow the weekly themes as will our Lent study. We will hold that on a Tuesday evening by Zoom\* and you are warmly invited to join us, whether you usually do or not. We begin at 7.45pm with a brief time of prayer and then explore the study, finishing by 9pm at the latest.

To give you a flavour, these are the weekly themes:

## The New Year's Day concert in Vienna



The New Year's Day Concert in Vienna has been on my bucket list ever since a school friend introduced me to Viennese music at the Royal Festival Hall ovér 60 years ago. The chance of winning a ticket in the ballot is very slim so perhaps this (probably) once-inà lifetime experience, after many unsuccessful attempts, of being lucky for the 2024 concert could be regarded as a 'miracle'?

The concert is held at the Musikverein - the home of the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra - in the heart of a seasonally vibrant Vienna. Just walking into the

hall takes one's breath away! It is a wonderful venue - also called the Golden Hall - bedecked for this annual event with beautiful flowers. The acoustics rank with the best in the World.

The concert consists of waltzes, marches, galops, polkas, overtures and quadrilles - mainly by the Strauss family. Before the second encore - the Blue Danube Waltz - the conductor gives a message of hope to the World - precisely what is conveyed in the Scriptures. Finally we have the Radetzky March during which the conductor - Christian Thielemann this year - directs the audience when and when not to clap.

The coverage of the concert on television (to over 90 countries) is excellent, but to actually be present in the Musikverein on New Year's morning hearing such beautifully played, uplifting music is truly magic.

#### **Recycling for Good Causes**

In the vestibule you will notice a largish box which advertises 'Recycling for good causes.'

Please donate your unwanted items from the following list. There are some leaflets available which tell you about what can be recycled but basically it is: Unwanted jewellery - including damaged items and costume jewellery and watches

Coins and currency - any age and UK and foreign both acceptable

Mobile phones, cameras, video cameras and gadgets including ipods, tablets but NOT laptops.

Stamps - single, loose and presentation packs.

The box contains a sack. When the sack is full Recycling for Good Causes will collect it and the church will receive 75% of the proceeds from the sale of the contents within about 8 weeks of collection. (As a guide, at High Cross they received a cheque for £80 - so it is definitely worth doing this!)
