Dear friends,

Imagine, if you will, that you are one of the first witnesses to the Resurrection. Maybe you are one of the women, making your cheerless way to the tomb in the first splinters of dawn, carrying spices with which to anoint the dead body of Jesus, wondering what you will do about the large stone sealing the grave. You arrive to find it rolled back, to be greeted by angels, to be told the impossible, astonishing, wonderful news that he is not dead but lives! You're scared; you're bewildered but deep inside you a thrill is growing.

Or perhaps you are Mary Magdalene, gone to the garden to weep, the one thing you thought you could do for your Lord denied you, his body moved or stolen. Only to be greeted through a mist of tears by his beloved voice speaking your name. Told by him to go back with a message for the disciples you become the 'apostle to the apostles.'

Maybe you are Peter or John, hearing the testimony of Mary and the other women, uncertain, disbelieving, yet knowing you *must* see for yourselves. You run to the tomb and there is the rolled-away stone, there are the discarded grave clothes. What can this mean? The truth stirs and awakens your griefnumbed hearts.

Or perhaps you are Thomas on that first Sunday evening, returning from your errand to a roomful of friends clamouring to tell you that they have seen Jesus. Oh, the bitterness of not having been there. Bitterness that becomes denial — it

Local Arrangement

Our Local Arrangement focused on The Leprosy Mission and we adapted the service around their Leprosy Mission Sunday resources.

The whole presentation was from Revelation 21:1-7 where it is revealed to the Apostle John through a vision that God will



send a new heaven and a new earth, when He will wipe every tear from our eyes, where there will be no mourning, crying or pain, all those former things passing away. What a wonderful promise. This is a reminder that no matter how dark and difficult the present may seem, God's promise of renewal and restoration is sure.

We saw slides of people in Odisha in India where 96% of the population have permanent and life changing disabilities caused by leprosy. They live in what looks like crumbing caves, with no hygiene facilities. Often begging is their only income and they cannot break out of the cycle of poverty.

Jesus spoke of his death and resurrection but that did not stop him from showing love and compassion to people when faced with their suffering. We too can look forward to a time when God will make all things new, but like Jesus, we need to help those who are in need, this is our opportunity to show love as we ourselves have been shown love.

It is crazy to think that £24 will provide medication for one person to be completely healed from leprosy. As recipients of God's transformative love and hope, we are invited to be agents of change in a world that longs for healing and restoration and there are few places where this longing is as urgent as in the leprosy colonies of Odisha State in Eastern India.

We had a retiring collection at the end of the service and we did indeed respond with love and compassion to these people. We raised £309 which is also gift aided and so The Leprosy Mission can claim back the tax paid on that sum to make it £386.25. This means that our donations will have helped 16 people at the very least, to be cured of this most debilitating disease. Thank you all for your generosity, kindness and compassion.

Thank you too to everyone who took part in the service, to the Musicians for choosing the hymns, for Heather preparing and presenting the prayers of intercession, for Doug on his guitar and Alison on the piano, for Douglas operating the MM; Matt for presenting the service, Sandra, Mike, Sue T, Gil, Margaret H, Lesley and Wendy for their participation. A real team effort, thank you so much for your donations as well. The whole service glorified our wonderful Maker and Redeemer, the One who makes all things new.

Recycling for Good Causes

In the vestibule you will notice a largish box which advertises 'Recycling for good causes.'

Please donate your unwanted items from the following list. There are some leaflets available which tell you about what can be recycled but basically it is: Unwanted jewellery - including damaged items and costume jewellery and watches

Coins and currency - any age and UK and foreign both acceptable

Mobile phones, cameras, video cameras and gadgets including ipods, tablets but NOT laptops.

Stamps - single, loose and presentation packs.

The box contains a sack. When the sack is full Recycling for Good Causes will collect it and the church will receive 75% of the proceeds from the sale of the contents within about 8 weeks of collection. (As a guide, at High Cross they received a cheque for £80 - so it is definitely worth doing this!)

In memoriam plaques




I am delighted to be able to tell you that **Camberley and District Funeral Directors** (Yorktown Road, College Town) are now sponsoring our memorial plagues.

Easter Sunday worship 20th April 10.30am will be led by our dear friend Maggy Garton.

Leaders from the Baptist, Methodist, Church of Scotland and the United Reformed Church have responded to the Prime Minister's announcement concerning further cuts to the international development budget.

In the statement, the leaders said:

We deeply lament the government's stated intention to make further cuts to the UK's international development budget. This would break a manifesto promise made to people in the world's poorest communities and have a devastating impact on lives and livelihoods across the globe. While there is a case to be made for increasing defence spending to support Ukraine in resisting Russian aggression, that shouldn't come at the cost of vital humanitarian and development programmes, which play a crucial role in promoting human security around the world.

"UK aid programmes protect women and girls from violence, provide costeffective vaccines to babies and voung children and support human rights defenders who work to prevent future conflict. Such programmes will be under threat if UK aid is further slashed by 40%"

"Our Churches have strongly encouraged and supported the UK in its commitment to international development, not only as a way of showing care to our alobal neighbours, but in recognition of the UK's historic and ongoing responsibilities to address the causes of global injustice, poverty, forced migration, climate change and conflict. It is a source of deep regret to see a backing away from that responsibility. A massively reduced UK aid budget would be experienced as a bitter blow by partners and communities in the global south, especially coming so soon after the devastating USAID cuts. We urge the government to rethink its decision immediately."

Circuit Merger





Greetings!

We are pleased to bring you the first edition of the Circuit Merger Newsletter.

Our aim is to keep people informed of what is happening/planned to happen as the Berkshire Surrey Borders Circuit and the Hampshire Surrey Border Circuit merge to become one circuit in September 2025. Here you will find information about the progress of the merger, what is involved and the opportunities which will arise to help, guide and take up roles in the merger and in the new circuit.

THE STORY SO FAR

The possibility of merging the two circuits came about in 2024 when the Circuit Leadership Team of BSBC were discussing the likely impact of both Revd Catherine Bowstead, Superintendent Minister, and retiring) in the summer of 2025.

Since it was highly unlikely that BSBC would find a THE BLACKWATER VALLEY CIRCUIT new superintendent, they approached HSBC to discuss the possibility of combining the two circuits Revd. Nick Oborski then becoming superintendent of the resulting merged circuit.

Both circuits agreed to explore this and, following a series of meetings, the resolutions to enable this went to all 17 church councils in both circuits. All 17 church Anne Day - anne.day@methodist.org.uk councils passed the resolutions.

This was then endorsed at the circuit meetings of both circuits and finally agreed at the District Synod on 13 March 25.

The next steps are for the circuit meetings to agree that the merger can go ahead, and then this will be taken to the next District Synod this spring.

Finance - To help with the merging of the finance and finance proceedures from both circuits.


HR - keeping the contracts of lay workers and other people in the circuits right, and recruiting, writing job descriptions and person specifications for the various roles is needed.

Sandhurst Churches Together at SYMC on Sunday 9th March 2025

Our theme for this service was: 'Be Still: Making the most of the wilderness' We had a good turnout to the service and a time of worship, group discussion and challenge. We were given a tea-light at the end of the service and Sharon encouraged us to light the tea-light for five minutes each night and just give that time over to God. She also gave us a print out of the words from Psalm 46: 'Be Still and Know that I am God'.

'Be still and know that I am God' – this is a familiar verse from Psalm 46 but did you know that this psalm was written during a time of conflict, fear and hardship. The Assyrian Army under King Sennacherib had surrounded the city of Jerusalem and was besieging it. He had already captured the Northern Territory of Israel and taken them into exile in Assyria. How very frightening for the inhabitants of Jerusalem, almost certain of their own destiny and destruction. And yet whilst this Psalm was being written God is quoted as saying 'Be Still and know that I am God'. Just how do we do this?

We find ourselves in turmoil and surrounded by troubles in life at times, sometimes we can't see a way out of our situation – we need to be still and know that He is God. To trust our lives to the living God who loves us and experience his presence. 'Being still' is not just physical stillness, that is, the absence of activity, but it is a deep inner surrender to God's will.

King Hezekiah of Judah prayed and so did the people of Jerusalem. God sent the Angel of the Lord to destroy the Assyrian army, all 185,000 of them, leaving just King Sennacherib who quickly retreated back to Nineveh in Assyria, (read the story in 2 Kings 18 and 19).

Jesus too withdrew to spend quiet times with his Heavenly Father, the longest of these times being straight after his baptism when he spent 40 days and nights in the wilderness. This was a time of preparation and contemplation, completely away from the troubles of everyday life allowing Jesus to be totally focused on his relationship with God and on the mission that God had given him to do. This must have been challenging for him, but with complete trust and surrender, God gave him the strength to see his ministry through.

There are several other characters who spent times in the wilderness, Elijah, Moses, the children of Israel and even Noah floating around aimlessly in the flood. All of these people were being prepared for something greater in their lives, the wilderness experience had a purpose, even if they couldn't see it at the time.

We need to trust in God recognising he is the ultimate source of strength and stability even when life throws challenges at us. So whether you are experiencing a difficult time in your lives, or whether you are preparing yourselves for some challenge or change in your life, God would encourage you to 'Be Still and Know that I am God' being fully reassured that He loves you, He has plans for you, He wants you to experience inner peace, inner contentment and fulfilment, always remembering that as it was said in the Psalm, that God is our secure refuge and fortress.
