The Minister writes...

I always feel rather nostalgic at this time of year. The distinctive scent of autumn instantly transports me back to my childhood and that of our own children's. It brings with it memories of the start of a new school year with all the ensuing excitement and perhaps a touch of nervousness too, the crispness of the mornings, and the afternoon walk home, scrunching leaves and acorns underfoot. I remember fondly Sunday tea-times watching family TV series: back in my day Black Beauty and Anne of Green Gables vied for top spot; later, watching with our own children, those had been replaced with The Borrowers, The Phoenix and the Carpet, and my all-time favourite: The Chronicles of Narnia.

What a joy to see the books I had loved since girlhood brought to life on TV. Comparing the computer graphics and animatronics of the late 1980's with what we take for granted these days, I realise how basic they were – but of course, I was a child brought up on Daktari and the early Dr Who series so they seemed very advanced at the time!

Walking Jackson the other day and enjoying the beauty of Keats' 'season of mists and mellow fruitfulness,' I indulged the bitter-sweetness of past memories. It seemed to me that life was simpler then. Our lives weren't taken over by computers and phones and, although there have always been demands on our time, there was more opportunity to pause before responding, more space to breathe. Yet, as I looked back through these rather rose-coloured spectacles, I was reminded of all the good things that come with technology. The sharing of a photo taken on my phone, some thoughts that might become a sermon recorded before I could forget them, the picking up of an urgent message, the ability of arranging a family get-together with one WhatsApp message rather than copious phone calls. And the advances in medicine and medical technology mean this is a far safer era to live in!

It's easy to look back and think things were better in 'the good old days': larger congregations, flourishing Sunday Schools, more of a sense of community in our local areas, more people willing and with the time available to volunteer for those organisations that depend on such help and struggle without it. But maybe those times weren't better, they were just different. We cannot halt progress; we move with it or we get left behind. Mourning what has gone drains us of the energy and enthusiasm to embrace the here and now.

There is one constant throughout it all: God and his love. He never changes and it never fails. He is always with us. He is there whether we are storing up new memories or struggling to remember old ones. He is there whether we are warmed by recollections of good times past or saddened by the loss of them and the people we shared them with. He doesn't leave us dwelling in the past but instead urges us on to new things, giving us the wisdom to discern and the strength to undertake what is necessary for us to walk in his way.

Several hymns speak to this theme and I was torn as to which words to leave you with. Perhaps these two say it best of all:

Through all the changing scenes of life, in trouble and in joy, the praises of my God shall still my heart and tongue employ.

(Nahum Tate and Nicholas Brady's hymn based on the words of Psalm 34)

And:

Great is thy faithfulness, O God my Father, there is no shadow of turning with thee; thou changest not, thy compassions they fail not; as thou hast been thou forever wilt be.

(Thomas Chisolm)

Wherever your thoughts and memories may lead you this autumn, never forget the love and faithfulness of our heavenly Father, always with you, constant through past, present and future.

It is tradition in our church not to use just red and white flowers—if you particularly want to use red and white, then please also include flowers of another colour.

Because the wall behind the communion table is black, some flower colours (dark red, blue or purple—receding) don't show up very well unless very carefully surrounded by light foliage. It is probably better to use white, yellow, orange, pink—bright (advancing) colours.

It is lovely to be able to give flowers to members of the congregation—a ministry of flowers.

Brightlight Theatre, performing "Songkeeper" by Janie Laritz at the Bromsgrove National Drama Festival Finals!

Sorry, my small brain cannot keep track of who-I-told-what about my recent long-term theatre project (competing in Drama Festivals) with Brightlight Theatre. So I am writing this for those who I promised to tell about it ... but forgot (with all due apology).

I won't bother repeating what happened at the Woking Drama Festival, October last year ... except to remind you that Brightlight Theatre resoundingly won that round and earned a (rare) automatic entry into the national finals. Nor will I bore you with the results of the Welwyn Drama Festival in May this year (which we entered for practice and came 4th, only a few points behind the winner). These are both(?) detailed in early editions of this newsletter.

This report is about the National Drama Festival Finals held in Bromsgrove at the end of July this year. Thirteen companies competed, coming from far and wide: one from Scotland, another from the Isle of Man, and a third from Amsterdam! Yes, really! I heard of other possible entrants who at least considered coming from Geneva and Gibraltar. Incredible. It seems there is a definite culture of Anglophile amateur dramatics in cities across Europe.

I managed to watch all but two of the competing performances and, as you can imagine, with each one already having won its own regional festival, the standard was gob-smackingly high!

The pressure was on! This really was a competition of the best-of-the-best ... everyone in the Songkeeper cast was thrilled to be compared with so many first-class companies.

Our scheduled performance slot was for the last of the one-act plays, on Saturday 2nd August, with only one full-length play scheduled the following afternoon (shortly before the Awards Ceremony).

I was very pleased with Brightlight Theatre's last-ever performance of Songkeeper. Definitely our best. Nothing went wrong. It all flowed smoothly, and the audience reacted positively as they had done to our previous performances (including our public performance at St Peter's Church Hall, Frimley, just before the finals, on Sat 12th July).

Though we didn't win any awards at the Bromsgrove national finals, we did manage to snag the joint-2nd-highest number of nominations!

Nominated for Technical Excellence Nominated for the Adjudicator's Award (for our puppetry team) Nominated for Best Supporting Player (Jenny Glaves, combining dance and puppetry)

Nominated for Best Actor (Liam Badcoe)

Nominated for Best Actor (Douglas Brown)

Also..

Runner-up for the Derek Jacobi Award for Best New Play Script "Songkeeper" by our Artistic Director, Jamie Lakritz

(James has since received an offer of a contract from Stage Scripts Ltd to publish it!)

As you might guess, the company which won the most nominations went on to win the Best Play Award, and the other company which received 5 nominations (like us) won the Runner Up Award. Both highly deserved in my opinion.

Although we don't know the points scores of the other competitors, it seems clear from our trawl of nominations that we scored highly amongst the leaders, likely close to both the winning and runner-up companies. But whether we actually came 3rd, or 4th, or... is only speculation. But given that this was Brightlight theatre's **first** appearance in the national finals, I couldn't be more proud of my fellow cast members.

And yes, if pressed, I might admit that I am secretly pleased that in three consecutive drama festivals, I was nominated in all three for Best Actor (and won the award at Woking). That's something to bore my grandchildren with, correct?

But maybe they will be more interested to learn what we did with the most challenging **ever** stage direction: "The whale appears". If you have never watched our show, I will leave that to your imagination.

From recent Methodist News:

Supporting Smiles by the Seaside (Chaplaincy at a coastal theme park).

Southend-on-Sea is a seaside city some 40 miles east of London. Each summer, it is filled with day-trippers seeking fun, thrills and, when the weather is good, sunshine, but who takes care of those who welcome them?

During the season, over two million visitors come through the gates of Adventure Island, a free to enter theme park on the seafront. Keeping all those people happy is an exhausting job for the 1000 staff, many of them



young, who work there. With the support of management, chaplaincy has become an important part of the park's welfare support for staff.

Deacon Sarah McDowall is a Methodist Minister who serves as chaplain to the

staff at the theme park. Since she began her work at the attraction in September 2020 she has become vital to the welfare of many of those working there. Some of them are undertaking their first jobs, often alongside family challenges or mental health concerns.

"Sometimes I listen, sometimes I signpost to other services, our counsellor, GPs, mental health charities, even a homelessness organisation. But mostly, I offer a safe space, a listening ear," says Sarah.

"The demands of the job, the constant smiles, long shifts and the pressure of working with the public can be overwhelming," says Sarah. "Chaplaincy provides a refuge, a moment of calm amid the busyness of theme park life."

The chaplaincy at Adventure Island has been active for over a decade, and Deacon Sarah is the third chaplain to serve there. Her role isn't confined to spiritual care, it's practical too. Her presence helps managers navigate complex personal issues and gives staff a trusted professional to turn to when life feels overwhelming.

"I listen, support, and remind them they're not alone," says Sarah.

Recycling for Good Causes

In the vestibule you will notice a largish box which advertises 'Recycling for good causes.'

Please donate your unwanted items from the following list. There are some leaflets available which tell you about what can be recycled but basically it is: Unwanted jewellery - including damaged items and costume jewellery and watches

Coins and currency - any age and UK and foreign both acceptable

Mobile phones, cameras, video cameras and gadgets including ipods, tablets but NOT laptops.

Stamps - single, loose and presentation packs.

The box contains a sack. When the sack is full Recycling for Good Causes will collect it and the church will receive 75% of the proceeds from the sale of the contents within about 8 weeks of collection. (As a guide, at High Cross they received a cheque for £80 - so it is definitely worth doing this!)
